

Stations of the Cross Service – What is it?

Simplified Accountable Leadership Team

Effective February 1, 2023: The Ad Council, SPRC, Finance and Trustees are now all combined into a single board model of governance. This newly formed group, Simplified Accountable Leadership Team (SALT) now only has 10 total members and these new members were each selected based on their requisite abilities to ensure the board has members with the appropriate knowledge and skills necessary to lead the Foothills Worship Center effectively into the future.

Some Frequently Asked Questions and Answers about the recent change made to our church leadership structure effective on February 1, 2023

What will this look like?

A unified Leadership Team of ten people where the whole group would handle the responsibilities of our current administrative committees (Church Council, Trustees, Staff Parish Relations, and Finance). Leadership Team members will serve staggered three-year terms for greater continuity. We will still have Work Teams (Missions, Visitation, Hospitality, etc.) and task forces.

Why change? What advantages does a Simplified Accountable Leadership Team model have over our previous structure?

- Mission-alignment: Synchronizes and aligns all the church's ministries
 with the mission, vision, and goals. Holistic, missionally-aligned decisionmaking becomes possible as leaders now have a better understanding of
 all aspects of the church (Previously committees were often forced to make
 decisions without knowing the goals or plans of the other committees or
 the impacts decisions will have on other areas).
- Efficiency: Removes bureaucratic redundancies allowing good decisions
 to be made quicker to take advantage of ministry opportunities or to deal
 with challenging situations as they arise (Previously, ideas could spend
 months or years making multiple stops in the permission cycle).

- Process Clarity: Creates a clearer, consistent decision-making process (Previously due to our complexity, leaders often felt like they were making up processes on the run which often meant a lack of consistency in how decisions were made).
- Greater lay involvement in the creation, adherence, and achievement
 of the mission, vision and goals: Removing bureaucratic redundancies
 allows more members to spend their time in service as disciples who make
 disciples. By consolidating administrative functions into just a single team,
 disciples can focus on using their spiritual gifts and passions for ministry to
 contribute to the vitality of the congregation as it seeks to reach the mission
 field. More ministry and less meetings is always a good thing.
- **Greater accountability:** When everyone is in charge, no one is actually held responsible. Our structure should enable leaders to hold themselves and others accountable for missional fruitfulness and vitality.

Where did this idea come from?

Many United Methodist churches have recently gone to a streamlined form of congregational governance which they have found to be more effective. Annual Conferences across the denomination are encouraging this development as they see the advantages of lean, more strategic church leadership that's now needed.

Is this allowed by United Methodist Church rules?

The United Methodist Church has stated that "the UM Discipline is very clear that every congregation shall organize itself in a way to be most effective at carrying out the mission of the church in its own setting. Congregations have permission to organize in the best way for them, using the Discipline as a guide." Our church received District approval at our 2022 Charge Conference for a needed change in our leadership structure and FWC has recently implemented this new model.

Won't this place too much power in the hands of just a few people?

While this will place a lot of responsibility upon a few people, the unified board assures greater accountability and transparency in decision making and a firm commitment to our mission. Church members would now know exactly how the decisions are made and who makes them. Church members would know who to speak to if they have ideas or concerns. The previous United Methodist Church

administrative structure sometimes led to an unhealthy control of power by either pastors, staff, cliques within the church, or ministry teams operating solo.

How will 10 people ever find the time and energy to accomplish the work that previously required four committees?

This change is not simply a structure change but also an adaptive change. The name "Simplified Accountable" is instructive. The Team will be trained in good governance practices common today in successful churches and non-profits. The Leadership Team is responsible for strategic governance and accountability: not micro-managing and carrying out ministry. Work Teams, pastors, and staff will be responsible for the majority of the day-to-day operations of the church.

How will the church membership know what work the Team is doing?

Although the Team meetings are not open to the public, and by invitation only, the agendas and minutes of each Team meeting will all be posted on the church website in a timely manner. Paper copies can also be made available if needed. The new leadership team (S.A.L.T.) will also host at least two town-hall meetings per year where the congregation will be invited to hear updates, future plans and be included in a question-and-answer time, to offer even greater transparency.
